WEBCAST participants

In addition to the 55 people who attended the Knowledge Exchange in Ottawa in person, another 20 computer lines were booked by organizations across the country, to allow more people to join in the KE from their offices without travelling to Ottawa. From 20 to 34 people watched the webcast each day. The number of participants at each location varied, with a largest group at the Yukon office of the Public Prosecution Service of Canada (PPSC), where 9 people participated.

The input from the webcast participants focused mainly on northern communities. Comments reflected on the good work being done by Child Advocacy Centres, and that such centres can "advocate for our children who would not necessarily have a voice and who have been abused."

Webcast participants expressed hope that Inuit children will also be given the opportunity to have a Children's Advocacy Centre or similar type of facility in their communities. Following this comment, there was a question about the necessary steps to start up a centre in Inuit communities.
