

Guideline 1 Child-focused Setting

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# Luna Child and Youth Advocacy Centre

Luna is one of 40 Child/Child and Youth Advocacy Centres located across Canada.

Luna is located in Calgary, Alberta on the traditional territories of the people of Treaty 7 region in Southern Alberta. Calgary, named Mohkinstsis in Blackfoot, is also home to Metis Nation Region 3.

## **Guideline 1: Child-Focused Setting**

The CAC/CYAC provides services to diverse populations of children, youth and their supporting family members in a welcome, physically and psychologically safe, neutral, trauma-informed and comfortable child-and youth friendly setting.

### We believe...

The child is our first priority.

Not the needs of the family.

# Safe, Welcoming, Comfortable & Neutral Child & Family Areas



## **Key Component**

All client and family areas, as well as investigative interview rooms, should be safe, welcoming, comfortable and neutral, and reduce anxiety.



### **Code of Conduct**

- Contact not related to CAC service provision between staff/volunteers and a child/client is prohibited.
- Physical contact between child/client and staff/MDT members must be consistent with the safety and well-being of the child/client.
- Staff/volunteer interaction with child clients should be interruptible and/or observable.
- It is the duty of staff to report suspected child abuse. Luna staff are mandatory reporters and Luna ensures that mandated reporter training is provided to all staff and volunteers.
- Updates to provincial legislation and mandated reporter laws are provided to staff and volunteers annually, if applicable.

## **Child Safety Assessment**

Luna's Assessment includes but is not limited to:

- Effective supervision of children
- Child proofing of all electrical plugs
- Sanitizing of playrooms on a regular basis
- Hot water faucets maintained at a non-scalding temperature
- Furniture and/or appliances securely held to walls
- Poisonous plants or chemicals stored out of child's reach
- Safety and evacuation plans in place

## Separation of Victims & Offenders



## **Key Component**

The CYAC must have policies and procedures that address the separation of victims and [alleged] offenders during the investigative process, and as necessary throughout delivery of the full array of CYAC services in order to provide a service that is physically and psychologically safe for children.

If a CYAC shares a building location with an existing agency that provides services to [alleged] offenders, there should be a separation between children, non-offending caregivers, and [alleged] offenders, for example, arranging to meet with [alleged] offenders on different floors or at different times of day.

## **Luna's Policy**

Luna does not permit alleged perpetrators to be on the premises at any time and prohibits the delivery of services to alleged adult perpetrators.

If any known or alleged perpetrators are found to be on the property, including those who may have accompanied the child or youth to Luna, they will be asked to leave the premises immediately in an appropriate manner by predetermined law enforcement personnel.

## **Key Component**

CYACs that serve children with problematic sexual behaviours should also make provisions to ensure the physical and psychological safety of all children and youth who visit the Centre.



### **Youth with PSBs**

Luna provides services to youth with problematic sexual behaviours, and appropriate safety protocols and practices have been developed and implemented to protect other children receiving services at the Luna.

Youth with PBSs who are accessing therapy though Luna's partnership with Alberta Health Services Child Abuse Service are within line-of-sight supervision while in the Child Space. Scheduling of therapy appointments for youth with PSBs intentionally ensures separation between children and family members and youth who have engaged in PSBs.

## **Supervision and Observation of Children & Youth**




## **Key Component**

Children and youth should be within sight and/or hearing distance at all times by CYAC staff, multidisciplinary team (MDT) members or volunteers when caregivers are not with the child (e.g., the caregiver is in an interview).




## Separation of Clients Involved in Different Investigations




## **Key Component**

Whenever possible, clients involved in different investigations should be kept separate to respect the confidentiality of children, youth, caregivers and investigations.

## Confidentiality Must Be Maintained At All Times



## **Key Component**

Confidentiality must be maintained at all times, except as permitted or required by law, including sharing subpoenaed documents with the court, reporting suspicions of child abuse to a child protection agency, and identifying safety risks to a child, self or someone else.



# Responsiveness to Accessibility Needs of Children & Families



## **Key Component**

The CYAC should be responsive to the accessibility needs of children and their families.







#### Examples of Accessibility accommodations:

- MDT members are co-located on site which is very important for clients who
  may need to return on several occasions for follow-up meetings
- Program location is wheel-chair accessible
- Bus stop in front of the facility
- Taxis are provided for families without transportation
- Families are provided with a parking pass for their visit
- Interview suits include access to felt board, papers and markers for children with diverse communication needs (i.e.select mutism)
- Access to a language line through one of the MDT partners and partnership with local newcomer agency for additional translation support
- Intake process invites families to identify any accessibility needs in advance of their visit to Luna and where needs are identified, a Specialized Care Plan is developed
